OVERVIEW OF THE MEP



Title 1, Part C

1966

- Congress authorized the Migrant Education Program (MEP)
 under Title 1, Part C of the Elementary and Secondary
 Education Act (ESEA) as a state-administered, state-operated
 program
- Reduce the unique challenges experienced by children of migratory agricultural workers




Our Goal

The goal of the Migrant Education Program is to assist all migratory students and youth in meeting challenging academic standards and achieving graduation from high school (or GED) with an education that prepares them for *responsible citizenship*, *further learning*, and *productive employment*.



Our Students

Migratory children and youth face multiple challenges because of their migratory lifestyle, including:

- Poor attendance
- Differences in state graduation requirements
- Lower graduation rates
- Lack of social connections
- Language barriers
- Anxiety
- Family separation
- Socioeconomic disadvantages



Our Services

- The AZ MEP conducts a state-wide comprehensive needs assessment to determine the greatest needs of migratory students
 - Involves surveying stakeholders such as parents, guardians, teachers, administrators, and students
- The results of the needs assessment are used to create a Service Delivery Plan
 - Guides the delivery of instructional and support services including parent advisory councils and family engagement events

 Recruiters visit farms and agribusinesses in their area to find migratory agricultural workers








Field Based Recruitment

School Based Recruitment



- MSIX is a web-based application that consolidates migrant student records
- MEP staff can send move notices to other states to inform them that a family has moved to their area


 Recruiters will often post flyers at strategic locations that migrant families frequent such as laundromats, churches, stores, restaurants, and

Identification

 Before receiving services, MEP staff use the definitions in the Non-Regulatory Guidance to determine if the worker(s) and their children are eligible for the Migrant Education Program.





Eligibility Process

Program staff complete a Certificate of Eligibility (COE)

Conduct Interview

Determine Eligibility

Recruiters ask about every move and job held by the worker in the last 36 months If approved, the MEP program will provide resources and services to the migrant family

Provide Services



Professional Learning

Recruiters receive continuous trainings and resources to help them identify and recruit eligible migrant families more efficiently.

GRANTS & FAMILY ENGAGEMENT



Migrant Education Program Grant

- Title I-C: Supplemental services that are above and beyond Title I-A
- MEP funds "shall be used to address the needs of migratory children that are not addressed by services available form other Federal or non-Federal programs."



Allocation by LEA

- Funding based on several criteria (# of students, PFS, summer school, alternative funding)
- # of students identified determines the Migrant Education Program Model (Consortia Lead, Participant, Individual Project)
- Regional Consortium Leads receive additional funds for administrative costs
- Student Counts August 31st thru September 30th



Instructional Services

Instructional Services Examples

Targeted, Standards-Driven Tutoring Programs: ELA and math standards mastery, mastery of standards in other core content areas

Targeted, Standards-Driven Enrichment Programs: Speech and debate team, STEM and STEAM programs, Math Olympiads, coding class, book club

In-Home Instruction: tutoring and enrichment services provided to the child at home

Distance Learning Programs: web-based or portable courses of instruction

Pre-School Services: Classroom needs, certificated teachers


Student Leadership Programs: Close-up programs

University-Based Summer Institutes: Migrant Student Summer Academy (MSSA)

Credit Recovery and High School Graduation Services: Portal Assisted Sequence (PASS), General Education Development (GED)



Instructional Services



23% of eligible migratory students ages 3-21 (33% of students served) received instructional services during the performance period



Support Services

Support Services Examples

Health: Medical, dental, vision, and counseling services; hygiene packets

Transportation: arrange transportation of migratory children to educational activities


School Supplies: books, calculators, computers and tablets, instructional software, printers and ink, caps and gowns, school uniforms

Migratory Student Advocacy: Developing and maintaining Student Profile to review with school personnel and family members to identify academic options; communicate between home and school stakeholders to identify needs; conduct monthly visits after school to discuss academic progress, needs, and challenges

College and Career Readiness: testing fees for college, summer camp fees



Support Services



68% of eligible migratory students received support services during the performance period



Other MEP Funded Expenses

- Cell Phones for MEP staff
- Non-Student and Student Travel
- Recruiting advertisement, and printing
- Student Transportation Services
- Travel reimbursements
- Student Field trips and Leadership camps
- General Supplies
- Library books, Textbooks Instructional Aids

Family Engagement

Parental Involvement

Section 1304(c)(3) of Non-Regulatory Guidance:



- It is a statutory requirement to have a Parent Advisory Council
- Parental involvement in the planning of the program enables parents to understand the program and encourages them to have informed conversations with MEP and school staff about their child's education
- Meetings times should be at convenient times for parents to attend
- You can provide, transportation, daycare, and food
- Materials should be in a language they understand



The Role of Parents in MEP

- Migratory parents play a pivotal role in planning the educational programs and projects in which their children participate.
- The Arizona MEP's local Parent Advisory Councils (PACs) and State Migratory Parent Advisory Council (SMPAC) meet regularly throughout the year to participate in the program's planning and evaluation.
